# Showcasing opportunities for scientists to contribute to the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals

#### Background

### **Side Event Summary**

The side event will be hosted by The World Academy of Sciences Regional Office for sub-Saharan Africa (TWAS-ROSSA) and The Organisation for Women in Science for the Developing World (OWSD) South African National Chapter. The aim is to creating awareness of the existing opportunities, at TWAS and OWSD so that scientists can contribute to the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) particularly: no poverty, zero hunger, good health and well-being, quality education, gender equality, clean water and sanitation, affordable and clean energy, decent work and economic growth, reduced inequalities and climate action. The side event is aimed at policy makers, young and senior scientists, particularly from Science and Technology Lagging Countries (STLCs) in sub-Saharan Africa, research institutions, science councils, RUFORUM members, members of academies of science and other organisations in the national system of innovation.

The World Academy of Sciences Regional Office for sub-Saharan Africa is one of the five regional offices of TWAS. TWAS-ROSSA has been hosted by the Academy of Science of South Africa since 2015 and was previously based at the African Academy of Sciences in Nairobi, Kenya. ASSAf is responsible for coordinating efforts to promote TWAS activities and its affiliated organisations in sub-Saharan Africa, including training fellowships, grants and awards, as recommended in TWAS' strategic plans. TWAS-ROSSA works closely with regional science organisations, notably senior & young academies of science, TWAS Young Affiliates Network, research institutions, science granting councils and other organisations in the National System of Innovation (NSI). At ASSAf, TWAS-ROSSA is aligned with the African Collaborations subprogramme which develops partnerships for ASSAf in the continent.

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The Organisation for Women in Science for the Developing World South African National Chapter is also hosted by ASSAf. The National Chapter was inaugurated in 2009 and is constituted by a group of OWSD members who aim to increase and promote female participation in science and technology (S&T) professions, in scientific leadership, and in the decision-making process at the national level.

Gender Science. in Innovation, Technology and Engineering (GenderInSITE) is an international initiative to promote the role of gender in science, innovation, technology and engineering, and to demonstrate how applying a gender lens to SITE can provide deeper insights, more effective programmes and more sustainable outcomes in the context of development. Focus areas include: agriculture and food security, education and the workforce, water and sanitation, health, energy, climate change, infrastructure, biodiversity, environmental management, urbanisation, and ICT. GenderInSITE has two regional focal points, Latin America & the Caribbean and sub-Saharan Africa. OWSD co-ordinates gender related activities in the southern Africa region. These activities are focused on policy development, human capital development, promotion and raising awareness in science, innovation, engineering, and technology for all, and engagement with key stakeholders.

## Purpose of the Side Event

The proposed event is aimed at creating awareness of the existing opportunities, reinforcing the importance of being affiliated to international, regional and national science organisations, promoting women scientists' participation and highlighting the importance of information sharing culture because access to information is still a major issue in the African continent.

### Objectives of the side Event

The event aims to:

- showcase the available opportunities (fellowships, prizes, scholarships, exchange programmes, affiliation and research grants) offered by TWAS and OWSD
- highlight the importance and benefits of being affiliated to these organisations
- highlight the importance of sharing information
- address gender related societal issues hindering women's participation in science
- address the critical need for African countries to establish OWSD national chapters so as to facilitate and promote women's participation in science and country development.

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## Approach and Methodology

This event will have four speakers who will each have a presentation of 20 minutes (maximum) about the topic and share their experiences, benefits of participation and affiliation to these programmes as individual scientists, their institutions and to the science community. The moderator will then take questions, suggestions and recommendations from participants and the speakers will then respond. The aim of this approach is to ignite interactive conversations on the topic at hand and to achieve tangible outcomes.

## Venue and Participants

The side event will be open to policy makers, men and women scientists, young and senior scientists, particularly from Science and Technology Lagging Countries (STLCs) in sub-Saharan Africa, research institutions, science councils, RUFORUM members, members of academies of science and other organisations in the national system of innovation.

#### **Expected Outputs**

The expected outcomes will be to:

- create awareness of the existing opportunities at TWAS and OWSD
- highlight the impact of young scientist programmes, importance of mobilising young scientists within the science system and reach out to disadvantaged young scientists
- suggest ways in which academies of science, TWAS-ROSSA, OWSD National Chapters and regional science organisations can contribute to the attainment of the Sustainable Development Goals
- advocate for the inclusion and participation of women in all fields of sciences
- challenge all organisations in the national system of innovation to apply a gender lens in all their activities
- provide a networking platform
