# HIGH LEVEL POLICY ROUND TABLE: BUILDING AFRICA'S HUMAN CAPITAL TO UNDERPIN ITS 21<sup>ST</sup> CENTURY DEVELOPMENT NEEDS

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## BACKGROUND

In February, 2024, The <u>African Union Second 10-Year Implementation Plan of Agenda 2063</u>, (STYIP) was launched. The implementation plan leverages earlier investments to create prospects for the "The Africa We Want." Goal two of STYIP aims to deliver, "well-educated citizens and skills revolution underpinned by science, technology and innovation (STI)". The STYIP aims to produce 100,000 African PhDs, a fifth of whom will be in Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) disciplines. While enrolment in higher/tertiary education has tripled over the past two decades across Africa, asymmetry in performance across different regions especially in PhD level training persists. Indeed, 2000 and 2019 PhD enrolments, increased from 9% to 34%, but with 4 out of 10 students (40%) registered in South Africa<sup>1</sup>. To be sure, the number of PhD Full Time Equivalents (FTEs) per 100,000 of agricultural populations remains low, less than 7 FTEs, compared to Brazil that has 31 PhD FTEs<sup>2</sup>. This limits SSA's ability for STI to underpin science led growth of the continent's agriculture sector.

What then must be done during this second decade of Agenda 2063 implementation? The STYIP provides the strategic direction that necessitates a balanced education systems that increases SSA ability to unlock opportunity for its young talent resident in the youth. To achieve the STYIP aspirations for a diverse continent that has varied capacities and challenges, requires that Africa leverage its resident capacities, continent-wide frameworks and flagship projects. Such investments should be informed by the AUC, African-Governments, Regional Economic Communities, the African Development Bank, Agriculture and related discipline Apex organs and Development Partners engagements for cost leverage opportunities. To ensure collated planning and outcomes, the Regional Universities Forum for Capacity Building in Africa (RUFORUM) now proposes to

#### **MEETING PURPOSE**

This policy round-table aims to create convergence on the design-to-implementation imperatives for developing a continental framework to guide strategic investments in developing human capital for Africa's agriculture and related disciplines for 21st Century. Senior Leaders of the agricultural education and development ecosystems will be able to use it as a forum to plan and collaborate on initiatives that will help draw in funding to expand Africa's tertiary education sector and deliver the necessary human capital.

#### **ROUND TABLE OBJECTIVES**

The Senior Leaders attending will deliberate on imperatives for road-map needed to design and for delivery of transformative education required to underpin science led economic growth. The meeting will be framed by two specific objectives:

- 1. Receive, consider, and provide guidance for creation of an AUC led Technical Working Group that will champion development of the road map for HC4A and related processes.
- 2. Identify key deliverables including but not limited to
  - a. Drafting of the Issue Paper and its elements including the drafting teams.
  - b. Engagement strategy for soliciting participation of key stakeholders and partners.
  - c. The resourcing strategy.
  - d. Events planning road map including the planning for AUC's Specialized Technical Working Committees.

#### APPROACH

To create convergence, lead presentations will be made to guide discussions. Moderated discussions will subsequently be used to deepen understanding and generate engagement of participants. Subsequently, participants will engage in deliberation that will agree on the major actions and next steps to be taken.











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#### **PARTICIPANTS**

The meeting will involve key stakeholders of the agriculture and related sectors of Africa's economy and education ecosystem. Key stakeholders include: AUC Departments (ESTI, ARBE); African Government, Higher Education Agencies/networks- AAU, IUCEA; Un agencies- UNESCO, FAO, ILO; Development Banks-AfDB, Badea, World Bank; Apex agriculture agencies- FARA, SROs; RECs-SADC, COMESA, ECOWAS, EAC, IGAD; Development Partners- Private Philanthropy and official development assistance agencies; Education agencies- Agrinatura, International Universities- WUR, One CGIAR, and RUFORUM network leaders (Vice chancellors from Fragile countries and the representatives of the RUFORUM Board).

### **EXPECTED OUTPUTS**

The following outputs are expected to be produced from the Senior Governments meetings

- a) The Technical Working Group established along with preliminary Terms of Reference to be developed subsequently.
- b) Key deliverables leading up to development of the HC4A road map and the requisite processes and actions identified and the next action areas prioritized.
- c) Requisite institutions engaged to inform, enrich, support and implement the HC4D
